

Introduction

NARRATIVE Matt Miller

(Please be seated.)

The words of Jesus compelled his hearers to listen attentively. His message was charged with an urgency for decision-making in favor of life, hope, and peace. In his life and speech, the new reign of God had come near. This reign brings with it a hospitality and generosity that ran counter to ancient thought. "I am the way, the truth, and the life," writes John of this Jesus. Thus, before the world knew Jesus' followers as "Christians," it knew them as "followers of *The Way*."

First Reflection: The Way of Jesus Leads Us to Praise and Thanksgiving

NARRATIVE Deb Grossman

The "way" of Jesus draws his followers into a great chorus of praise. In Luke, we read: "The whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen." The song of the church, especially in hymns, unites us with this ongoing chorus. Let us join our voices with that mighty throng in singing our praise.

The hymn "Alleluia! Sing to Jesus" is sung to the rousing Welsh hymn tune "*Hyfrydol*." It was written by Rowland Hugh Prichard when he was only nineteen years old. Sing it as the Welsh would sing it, robustly and full of conviction.

Second Reflection: The Way of Jesus Calls Us to the Water

NARRATIVE

(Please be seated.) The "way" of Jesus calls us to the water of baptism as he himself was baptized by John the Baptist. St. Paul explains that in baptism we are joined to the death and resurrection of Christ. He wrote these words in a letter to the church in Rome, "We have been buried with him by baptism into death so that, as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life."

Brian Wren captures this newness of life in his hymn "Lord, When You Came to Jordan," with these words: "Lord, bring us to our Jordan of newly opened eyes."


Third Reflection: The Way of Jesus Calls Us to True Discipleship

NARRATIVE Rebecca Lyon

(Please be seated.) The "way" of Jesus calls us to true discipleship. His first disciples knew this well. In Matthew, we read, "As Jesus walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother casting a net into the sea – for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fish for people.' Immediately they left the boat and followed Jesus."

"Jesus Calls Us O'er the Tumult" is a well-known hymn of discipleship. It is the gospel account of the calling of Simon Peter and Andrew. We, too, as Simon Peter and Andrew, are called to Christian discipleship in answering the call of Jesus, "Come, follow me."

Fourth Reflection: The Way of Jesus Compels Us to Love

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus compels us to love. When asked about the Law's greatest commandment, Jesus answered, "You shall love the Lord you God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Jesus calls us even to love our enemies. He told us, "If you have love for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples." St. Paul writes, "If I have all faith...but do not have love, I am nothing...Faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love."

St. Paul's eloquent poem on love is paraphrased in the hymn "Though I May Speak with Bravest Fire." The melody is an adaptation by Hal H. Hopson of the English folk tune, "O Waly, Waly," which has been retitled "The Gift of Love."

Fifth Reflection: The Way of Jesus Leads Us from Darkness to Light

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus leads us from darkness to light. In John's Gospel we read, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." Following the Jesus way calls us to bear this light to others. "You are the light of the world," Jesus said. "No one after lighting a lamp puts it under a bushel basket, but on the lamp stand, and it gives light to all the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others so that they may see your good works and give glory to God."

The simple song, "This Little Light of Mine" uniquely captures the meaning of these words of Jesus. Its catchy tune is a favorite of adults as well as children. Typical of all spirituals, it is easy to sing and is direct in its message.

Sixth Reflection: The Way of Jesus Calls Us to Claim God's Loving Care

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus calls us to claim God's loving care. The metaphor of shepherd is much treasured in this regard. "I am the good shepherd," says Jesus in John's Gospel. "The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

Psalm 23, The Shepherd Psalm, captures the soul's deep longing for God's presence in our daily lives. This Psalm's most well-known and loved paraphrase is "The Lord's My Shepherd, I'll Not Want." This metrical setting is Scottish through and through. It first appeared in the *Scottish Psalter*, 1650. The tune, "*Crimond*," was written by hymn tune composer Jessie Seymour Irvine, who wrote it in 1872.

Seventh Reflection: The Way of Jesus Leads Us to Wholeness

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus leads us to wholeness. It inspires each of us to experience life as a sacred gift from God. Wherever we look in the gospels, we discover Jesus with those who are suffering and in need for life to be restored.

From his prison cell, John the Baptist inquired whether Jesus was, indeed, the one sent by God. Jesus replied, "Go and tell John what you have seen and heard: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have good news brought to them." To be made whole is to have our vision restored so that we see more clearly God's presence in our daily lives.

The hymn "Be Thou My Vision" is charged with an earnest prayer for healing and wholeness. This hymn is pure Irish, translated from an ancient poem by two Irish women, Mary E. Byrne and Eleanor Hull. The tune "Slane" is adapted from an old Irish ballad. In both text and tune, "Be Thou My Vision" uniquely captures the poetic beauty and nature of Celtic spirituality.


Eighth Reflection:The Way of Jesus Invites Us to Eat with Him

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus invites all of us to eat with him. Presumed to be a stranger by his own followers on the road to Emmaus, Jesus remained with them for the evening meal. It was when this guest became host, breaking bread at table, that the disciples' "eyes were opened, and they recognized him." Jesus is still made known to all who need him in bread broken and wine poured. For in John, Jesus says to us all, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."

Sylvia Dunstan, in her hymn "All Who Hunger, Gather Gladly" expressed this beautifully, especially in the phrase. "All who hunger, never strangers; seeker be a welcome guest." This thought is reinforced as each stanza ends with, "Taste and see the grace eternal. Taste and see that God is good," This fresh, upbeat communion text is appropriately wedded to the catchy, early American tune "Holy Manna."

Ninth Reflection: The Way of Jesus Leads Us to Eternal Life

NARRATIVE

The "way" of Jesus leads us to life eternal. Belief in the resurrection is rooted in confidence that God is the living God and therefore will not abandon the faithful at death. Jesus' promises of this are among the most well-remembered passages from the gospel of John: "I have come that (you) may have life, and have it abundantly;" "those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty;" "the water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life;" and "I am the resurrection and the life – those who believe in me, even though they die, will live."

This thought is beautifully expressed in the phrase "Drink the wine of resurrection" from the Brian Wren's Easter hymn, "Christ Is Risen! Shout Hosanna!" It is appropriately paired, in many hymnals, with the tune "Hymn to Joy," taken from the last movement of Beethoven's *Symphony No. 9*.

Tenth Reflection:

The Way of Jesus Compels Us to Give Ourselves in Service to Others

NARRATIVE

(Please be seated.) The "way" of Jesus compels us to give ourselves in service to others. As his body, the church, we are called to follow in his way, faithfully bearing our mission and witness to a world sorely in need of hope, healing, and justice.

The song of the church, as represented by this small sampling, has helped us to reflect on the way of Jesus for us today as both "truth" and "life." As these hymns have addressed God's work in the world, so will new poems and melodies be crafted for the purpose of bringing our prayer and praise to song. Thus, the "great cloud of witnesses" continues to grow.

The late hymn writer Jaroslav (Ya-ra-slaf) Vajda (Va-hee-duh) has penned a fitting text that serves well as a blessing for our going forth. In his hymn, "Go, My Children, with My Blessing," we are admonished to "grow in love and love by serving, joyful and free." It is sung to the Welsh melody " $Ar \ hyd \ y \ nos" \ (Ar \ -hid - \bar{a} - n\bar{o}s)$.
